Work Zone Safety

April 8-12 is Work Zone Safety Week. We encourage all motorists to remain aware of work zones and to drive safely through them. Over the past three years, there have been 31 fatalities and 123 serious injuries in work zones in Minnesota. Both motorists and workers are at risk in work zones. Distracted driving and speeding are the greatest con-

tributors to work zone crashes. With construction season now in full swing, work zones are springing up statewide. Motorists can check 511mn.org to check for work zones while planning to travel, and are encouraged to plan for delays.
