Stabbing Investigation

On Tuesday, November 1st, officers were dispatched to a reported stabbing. On arrival, **Officer Said Hilowle, Greta Luiken and Josh Alexander** found the victim bleeding from a leg wound. The victim told officers that the suspect, Alexander VanBogart, 21, had come to the residence and forced his way inside despite being told he was not welcome. The victim was physically pushing VanBogart out the door when VanBogart stabbed him once in the leg. He was transported to the hospital. **Officers John Pesta,**

Keith Voegel, Mallory House, Matt Shuda, Sergeants Mark Krenik, Eric Sammon and RCSO Deputy Derek Estrem went to VanBogart’s residence, and after watching the house, could see him inside despite his refusal to open the door. Officers eventually entered the house and arrested VanBogart. **Detectives Scott Duncan, Jeff Burbank, Matt Kolling and Sergeant Brandon Gliem** responded to assist with the investigation. VanBogart was jailed and charged with 2nd degree As-

sault (two counts). His bail was set at \$10,000 with conditions.

Gas Drive-Off Leads to More

On Saturday, October 29th, **Officer Chris Tonjum** took a report of a gas drive-off from a local convenience store. Ofc. Tonjum was provided with a license plate of the vehicle as well as the suspect’s description. He went to the suspect’s residence, and a short time later saw the suspect’s vehicle approaching. The suspect stopped, turned and drove away quickly. Ofc. Tonjum and **Officer Josh Alexander** pursued

the vehicle for several blocks before it stopped. The suspect, Krissandra Moriarity, 33, exited her vehicle and begin to apologize to the officers. She was arrested and transported to jail. A search of her purse at the jail revealed to small baggies with suspected methamphetamine residue. Moriarity was charged with Theft, Fleeing a Peace Officer and 5th degree Controlled Substances. Her bail was set at \$5,000 with conditions.

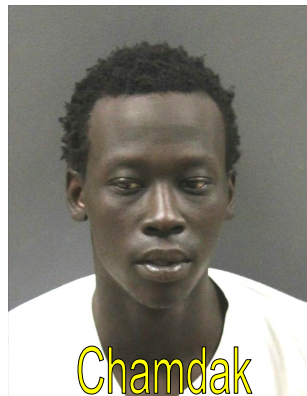

Unwanted Shower

On Tuesday, November 1st, while investigating an assault, officers detained two males for questioning. While in the holding cells, one of the males stood on a bench and began to tamper with the fire sprinkler when the cover broke loose and released a torrent of water. **CSO Mike Shuda** notified officers, who immediately responded to help. **Officers Josh Alexander, Said Hilowle, Greta Luiken, John Pesta, Detectives Jeff Bur-**



bank, Scott Duncan, and Sergeants Mark Krenik and Eric Sammon worked to safely remove the two detainees and remove water from the building. **Faribault Fire** and custodian **Paul Caron** also responded from home to help with the cleanup. The suspect, Gak Chamdak, 20, was charged with 1st degree Criminal Damage to Property. He was released on his own recognizance.

Traffic Arrest

On Saturday, October 29th, officers were notified of a possible intoxicated driver. A short time later, **Officer Josh Alexander** saw the suspect vehicle and turned to follow it. He noted the vehicle was travelling well in excess of the posted speed limit. Ofc. Alexander caught up to the vehicle and stopped it as it entered the freeway, and **Officer Chris Tonjum** arrived to assist. Ofc. Alexander met with the two occupants, and could smell the odor of an alcoholic beverage coming from the vehicle. He

also saw a glass methamphetamine pipe in the glove box as the occupants were retrieving documents. Inside the vehicle, Ofc. Alexander found two open alcohol containers. He identified the driver as Brady Edwards, 27, and learned his driver's license was suspended. Edwards was jailed and charged with driving After Suspension, Open Bottle, and 5th degree Controlled Substances (two counts). He was released on his own recognizance. The passenger, Mario Corea, 33, was cited for Open Bottle.
