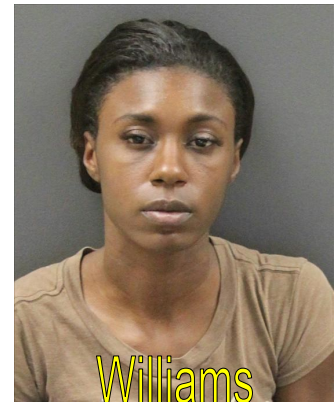

Domestic Assault Arrest

On Tuesday, October 3rd, **Officers Mallory House, Michael Shuda and Josh Alexander** responded to a reported domestic assault. The victim's daughter reported that her father is frequently abused by his girlfriend, and had just been assaulted. The victim reported the suspect, Judana Williams, 24, became upset with him and began screaming, hitting and scratching him. Officers

could see several fresh scratches on his face and neck and noted his eye appeared bruised. The suspect stated she had been hit several times by the victim, but did not display any signs of injury. Williams was arrested and jailed. She was cited for Domestic Assault, and she was released on her own recognizance by the court.



Domestic Violence Awareness Month

In October 1987, the first Domestic Violence Awareness Month was observed. That same year the first national toll-free hotline was begun. In 1989 the first Domestic Violence Awareness Month Commemorative Legislation was passed by the U.S. Congress. Such legislation has passed every year since with NCADV providing key leadership in this effort.

According to the 2016 Femicide Report compiled by the Minnesota Coalition for Battered Women (MCBW), at least 18 women died from domestic violence last year, and at least three family members/friends/interveners were murdered. At least 14 minor children were left motherless due to domestic violence murders.

The purple ribbon campaign: Across the country,

families and friends of victims of domestic violence have adopted the purple ribbon to honor loved ones who have lost their lives at the hands of someone they loved and trusted. The display of purple ribbons conveys a powerful message that there is no place for domestic violence in the homes, neighborhoods, schools, or workplaces in our community.

Talk to your family: Open communication about domestic violence, including appropriate behavior and boundaries, especially when dating, and what to

do if you experience any type of behavior outside of these boundaries is important.

Speak up: If you have reason to suspect someone you know is a victim of domestic violence—do not ignore it. Should you witness abuse, whether it is someone you know or a complete stranger, call the police immediately. If you know someone who is a perpetrator, let him or her know it is a crime. Explain you strongly disapprove of their behavior and encourage him or her to get help.
