Happy Birthday

On February 16, 1968, the first-ever 911 call was placed in Haleyville, Alabama. Although use of 999 for emergency calls had been in use in Great Britain since 1937, it wasn't until 1967 that Congress passed a legal mandate for the development of a single, nationwide emergency phone number. The Federal Communications Commission and AT&T decided on 911, as it would be easy to remember and easy to dial. The Alabama Telephone Company, upset they had not been consulted, developed a 911 system

two weeks before AT&T implemented the number in Huntington, Indiana.

Canada began implementing 911 in 1972, and Mexico switched to 911 in 2016. And late last year, text-to-911 became available in Minnesota.

Our local 911 calls are answered by the Rice Steele 911 Center in Owatonna. However, cell 911 calls placed on or near freeways are answered by the Minnesota State Patrol in Rochester. In either case, it is very

important to provide the caller with your location to avoid delays in getting assistance to you.



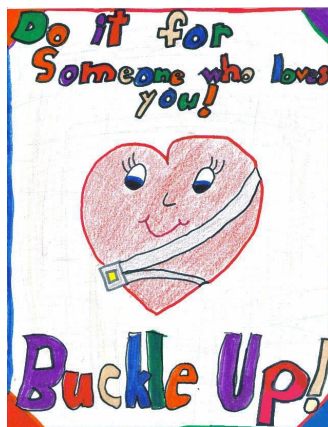

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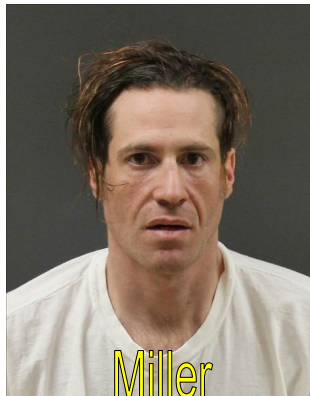

OFP Violation

On Tuesday, February 13th, **Officer Sean Smallen** responded to an Order for Protection (OFP) violation report. The reporting party, a guardian for one of the victims, stated the suspect had called the victims after being served the OFP. The victims’ phones showed the time of the call. Ofc. Smallen then contacted the deputy who served the order, and he verified that the order had been served prior to



the phone calls. Ofc. Smallen contacted the police department where the suspect resided, who subsequently arrested the suspect, Wayne Miller, 40. After being read his *Miranda* rights, Miller told Ofc. Smallen that he attempted to call the victims prior to receiving the order. Miller was charged with Violating an OFP, and he was released on his own recognizance by the court.

No Parking Zone

On Monday, February 12, **Officers Michael Shuda, Ben Johns, Karl Willers** and **Sergeant Brandon Gliem** were dispatched to a vehicle parked in the middle of the road. The vehicle was reportedly revving its engine and appeared to have a flat tire. When Ofc. Shuda arrived, he observed a lone male exit the vehicle, and appeared to stumble as he was walking. The male showed signs of intoxication. Ofc. Johns noted the vehicle tracks indicated the vehicle had driven through

a yard, and was now leaking transmission fluid. Ofc. Shuda administered field sobriety tests to the driver, identified as Geraldo Limon, 43. Limon did not successfully perform the tests, and a preliminary breath test indicated Limon was over the .08 blood alcohol limit. He was arrested. At the jail, Limon refused to provide a breath, blood, or urine sample for testing. Limon was charged with DWI and Refusal to Test. He was released on his own recognizance by the court.



Warrant Watch

This week, we’re looking for John Sullivan, 50. He is the subject of a warrant for failing to appear for Driving After Cancellation and No Insurance. Sullivan is 5’9” tall, weighs 155 pounds, has brown hair and hazel eyes.
